

2 Sections

- Elementary
- Secondary

Discussion questions

- Options for each topic on the dvd
- Questions include:
 - Easy-testing recall and comprehension
 - Moderate-requires analysis
 - More Difficult-requires higher order critical thinking



Resource Guide

Secondary Example:

- 1. Coming Out
 - a) What does the term "coming out" mean?
 - b) Describe a time when a friend or family member disclosed something personal.
 - c) Describe a time when a friend or family member came out to you about being LGBTQ.
- 2. How would you support a friend or family member who has come out to you?
- 3. Coming out can be a life long process for people who identify as LGBTO.
 - a) What are some assumptions we make about people? (eg. that a husband has a wife and a child has a mother and a father).
 - b) What could you do differently to be more inclusive of people? (eg. Language use words that are inclusive, like the term "partner" instead of husband/wife, or "guardian" and "parent" instead of mom or dad.)

How the DVD Is Being Used

Schools

- Staff Training
- Classroom learning in related subjects (civics, peer helping, parenting, health, etc.)
- Building support for GSAs
- Addressing particular issues (language, discrimination, bullying)

School Boards

- System wide training
- Promoting equity and inclusion
- Sharing the DVD with other boards to support their work

Community

- Used in a variety of social service agencies to provide training to their staff
- Shown to youth in several different settings to promote equity and inclusion.
- Youth are linking to videos via social media to promote further education and acceptance


